IDEA

The Detroit Free Clinic Research Consortium (FCRC) plans to create a patient data repository of five Detroit student-run free clinics, with a goal of identifying the specific health needs of the community

RATIONALE

- In the US, approximately 29 million Americans were uninsured as of $2017.^{1}$
- Free clinics provide care to many of these patients and close health gaps.²
- Financial support for free clinics has been declining, reported in 2016 by the National Association of Free and Charitable Clinics to be as much as 20%.³
- Free clinics remain under-researched.⁴
- Declining funding highlights the acute need for research and targeted care approaches.
- FCRC aims to compile patient data from five Detroit based free clinics and conduct communitydriven research to identify the unique patient health concerns

METHODS

• FCRC will focus on five student-run free clinics in Detroit, Michigan.

• The institutional review board (IRB) was contacted regarding the feasibility of creating a free clinic patient database. It was determined that a data repository can be created through the IRB, and all subsequent research studies will require individual

• Recruitment is underway for creation of an executive board consisting of 3 research co-chairs, 5 research coordinators, 3 database coordinators, and 4 faculty supervisors.

• Once the organization has been established, we plan to conduct an initial large-scale research study seeking to identify the top 10 health concerns of the Detroit free clinic population.

We will use this information to inform local free clinics and help to guide patient care.

• Bi-weekly organization meetings will be planned to discuss current research projects, generate new research ideas, and discuss results.

- (1) To conduct unified research projects to expand population health research in Detroit's free clinic population in order to better understand the unique health concerns, as well as structural and community influences
- (2) To provide a mechanism to monitor the changing needs of urban free-clinic patients
- (3) To identify methods to and leverage new public health discoveries to improve quality of care funding for free clinics
- (4) To demonstrate the benefit to regional research consortiums
